Remembrance Day Ceremony

What is the significance of the red poppy on Remembrance Day?

It was the French YMCA Secretary, Madam Guerin, who, in 1918, conceived the idea of selling silk poppies to help soldiers in need. They were first sold in England, on Armistice Day 1921, by members of The British Legion, to raise money for those who had been incapacitated by the war. The practice began in Australia the same year and was promoted by the Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia, now known as the Returned and Services League of Australia. Since 1921 wearing a poppy has allowed Australians to show they have not forgotten the 103,000 Australian service men and women, who gave their lives in war and conflicts to this day.

Year 9 Future Makers


